# Coronavirus Transmission and Domestic Canines by Ken Bruwelheide

With the deadly Covid-19 pandemic upon us there is a lot of confusing information circulating about how the virus infects people, transmission streams, and more. It is known that the current Covid-19 is related to a family of coronaviruses which humans have experienced for many years.

Given the suspected origin of Covid-19 for humans I wondered if this specific virus could infect canines. Afterall on about April 22, 2020 two domestic cats were infected by Covid-19 in New York. So...while there are several related coronaviruses that may be contracted and spread by canines Covid-19 is not one of them. One of the most common versions is referred to as canine coronavirus which causes an intestinal disorder including diarrhea, vomiting, and intestinal distress in young dogs. This strain spreads through feces when dogs eat poop. This sounds all too familiar, over time, with my dogs.

I gathered a lot of information by using an internet search engine (Google) applying the search string "Coronavirus transmission and domestic canines." The resulting list of articles is long and inclusive as well as informative and interesting. Several references state that while there is a canine respiratory coronavirus, this is not the specific Covid-19 and not thought to be a health threat to dogs. I checked out this information with my veterinarian.

As I write this column it is Tuesday, April 28. The national news this morning reported a dog (pug) in South Carolina that tested positive for Covid-19. The incident was reported to be likely a human (owner) to dog transmission since several family members had tested positive for Covid-19. As I said it is confusing so be careful out there.

about equal. Some of their puppies grow to be great dogs and some cattle crap grows great vegetables, but a lot do neither. A real Dogger knows this. Doggers invest in blood lines, real live puppies and other Doggers, not magical training tricks, mythical breeding, spiritual dreams, or vegetables. This polishes their soul but depletes their pocketbook.



I have the pleasure of knowing some real Doggers. Wally Wahl, Butch Nelson, Tom Ness and Sandy Gunn come quickly to mind. Like their simple names, they are humble men. All four are very different in exterior and process but similar inside. Heck, if you would skin them to the Soul, there would be no telling them apart.

Wally is tall, gruff and tough. He uses colorful language and a lot of physical contact in his training. He can be intimidating, especially when he wears his cowboy hat, but that is just tin siding. Want to melt that scary man's heart? Bring out your kids or a puppy or have him talk of dogs gone by. A breeder for four generations of versatile champions and many utility prized dogs, his greatest gift to the dog world is training others how to train their dog. I learned more about how to read and train a dog from Wally than all the 47 training books, seminars, and experts I have read, attended and listened to.

His knowledge sometimes storms out of him scaring away the timid. Weather it, the reward is worth it.

Butch Nelson is generous to fault. Sometimes I think he would give it all away if anyone asked for it. Heck, he might have already. He is short, square, nimble footed, gregarious and smiling. Even when he's angry as a hornet he will end a sentence with a grin and a chuckle. Butch cannot walk by a pup or child without touching them or starting a conversation. His hands know. Hands as thick and strong as Hebron bricks. Butch cannot stand to see an inexperience handler struggle. He'll watch and wait. Walk away then walk back. Eventually he will get overcome, stop everything, and show her or him a little trick to help get a message across to a dog. Magic he is. He knows more magic then ten of them dime store experts traveling across the country selling silver bullets.



Hall of Famer Tom or T.P. Ness is a slender, energic and agreeable char-

acter. His story is interesting and I recommend googling it. He has field championed over 30 dogs and placed hundreds. It is unsettling to come onto Oahe Kennels and ask the kennel guy sweeping poo where the Hall of Famer is, only to find out your talking to him. Tom ain't rich in the human way, or vain, or even wearing a cowboy hat but he is a Dogger through and through. Tom goes out of his way to make sure there is a place to train or run a field test for the individual or club. Tom will show anyone that asks how to force fetch a timid dog (he is the master and damages no spirit in the process) or how to properly plant a pheasant without strings or a cage. He does it for anyone who asks. Even those not associated with



his registry, or breed, or like. Tom always has a few misfit dogs wondering around the place and welcomes like humans. Why some folks might think Tom is a wee bit different. That fits. Fits because his breed of choice is the English Cocker, and everyone knows a good Cocker should be a wee bit crazy.

Sandy Gunn of Gunnstalk Kennels is a different breed of Dogger. A rare and special breed. His hometown of Sydney, Nova Scotia is so far east it is southeast of Houlton, Maine though he now lives in Norwood, Ontario. Sandy, always a twinkle in his eye, is a spry 135 pounder. Always a gentleman, always dapper, white haired, bearded and kind to a fault. Ageless. He bred his first litter when dinosaurs still roamed the earth. Since then he has bred many more. He has bred Gordon Setters, Jack Russell Terriers, German Shorthairs, Field Spaniels, Labradors, Rough Collie, and Border Terrier, but Pointers are his specialty. Over 45 years he produced 44 litters of the finest hunters and champion pointers.

He has competed in and judged Field Trial Pointing Breeds in CKC, AKC, UKC, AF, The KC, NSTRA, and NZKC. He is a master in the show ring. An "All Breeds"

Judge. Always in demand. He has Judged in Argentina, Australia, Bermuda, China, Columbia, England, New Zealand, Scotland, South Korea and the USA. He knew and knows all the great dog men and women. He was friends with Robert Wehle and edited his works.

Information from Sandy comes softly like morning light to the day. An educator by trade, Sandy is tolerant to youthful ignorance and boastfulness. He allows unfounded banter to go on around him with little input beyond rapped attention. Then quietly he asks a question and the truth is uncovered. A different kind of magic. Magic given freely, quietly and gentlemanly.

Doggers are different but the same. They all are generous and lack the phony gene. It comes from being honest with the dog. Dogs respond to honest. Doggers like their humans to honest just like their dogs. Doggers care not what your breed of choice is but they do look for humans, that like themselves, have an interesting soul shaped and polished by rubbing up against dogs.

Doggers have added greatness to me and my children's lives. They have made me better. Been role models for my children. If you have not already adopted a Dogger, find one and make yourself an inconvenience. The Dogger will act up and try and chase you off but remain persistent. Eventually the Dogger will give you a job. Once you have a job do it well. Fetch the water. Plant the Birds. Sweep the floor. Switch out dogs. Always wash your hands before handling puppies. Listen. No information ever entered your mouth. Be humble. Be a gentleman. Be appreciative. Grow. Become a Dogger.

### BLUE COLLAR TRAINING: Teaching a puppy to give into the lead.

**Warning** do not attach a rope collar on a pup until you are proficient at tying a Bowline knot. That's the only knot to tie that will keep your puppy from chocking itself. Google <a href="www.netknots.com">www.netknots.com</a> Then scroll down and find Bowline Knot. It will be illustrated with tying instructions.

This is a old Delmar Smith method. This only works if the breeder uses this at 5-8 weeks old. You need to have puppies together, then they teach themselves the pressure points on their necks. One thing for sure puppies like to bite, chew and play. With the leads ropes



attached they bite on the ropes when they romp not on each other thus its teaches them to pull on the ropes, teaching them to give into the lead and they don't chew on each other. Once the pup gets used to being yanked and pulled by the ropes on it's neck, they will be ready for the next step, getting a puppy on a to a long lead for its first exposure to birds in the field.

# Patellar Luxation in Dogs from petmed.com

Patellar luxation occurs when the dog's kneecap (patella) is dislocated from its normal anatomic position in the groove of the thigh bone (femur). When the kneecap is dislocated from the groove of the thigh bone, it can only be returned to its normal position once the quadriceps muscles in the hind legs of the animal relax and lengthen. It is for this reason that most dogs with the condition will hold up their hind legs for a few minutes.


A dislocated kneecap is one of the most prevalent knee joint abnormalities in dogs. Female dogs are 1 1/2 times more likely to acquire the condition.

**Symptoms and Types:** The specific symptoms of a dislocated kneecap will depend on the severity and persistence of the condition, as well as the amount of degenerative arthritis that is involved. Typically, a dog with a dislocated kneecap will exhibit prolonged abnormal hindlimb movement, occasional skipping or hindlimb *lameness*, and sudden lameness.

The dog will rarely feel pain or discomfort once the kneecap is out of position, only feeling pain at the moment the kneecap slides out of the thigh bone's ridges.

**Causes:** A dislocated kneecap is usually caused by a genetic malformation or trauma. The clinical signs of the condition will normally start showing approximately four months after birth.

Diagnosis: A dislocated kneecap is diagnosed through a variety of means. Top view (craniocaudal) and side view (mediolateral) X-rays of the stifle joint, hip, and hock may be used to detect bending and twisting of the thigh bone and larger bone of the lower leg. Skyline X-rays may reveal a shallow, flattened, or curved groove of the thigh bone. A fluid sample taken from the joint and an analysis of the lubricating fluid in the joint (synovial fluid) will show a small increase in mononuclear cells. It is also necessary for the veterinarian to perform an examination by touch to feel for kneecap freedom.



**Treatment:** Medical treatment for kneecap dislocation has very little effectiveness; surgery is the preferred treatment of choice for severe cases. Surgery can correct both the affected structures and the movement of the kneecap itself, and in 90 percent of cases, frees the dog from lameness and dysfunction.

The kneecap may be fastened on the outside of the bone to prevent it from sliding towards the inside. Alternatively, the groove of the thigh bone may be deepened so that it can better hold the kneecap.

**Living and Management:** Follow-up treatment after successful surgery will include leash walk exercise for one month (avoid jumping) and yearly examinations to check for progress. It is important that dog owners are aware that there is a high possibility of recurrence (48 percent), although the dislocation will be considerably less severe than the original incidence. Because kneecap dislocation is genetically inherited, the breeding of affected dogs is highly discouraged.

**Prevention:** There are currently no known preventative measures for this medical condition.

### Turkey Cutlets with Mixed Greens & Herb Vinaigrette

#### **Turkey Cutlets with Greens Ingredients:**

1 turkey breast

1 cup flour

1 tbsp salt

1/2 tbsp pepper

2 eggs

1 tbsp water

1 cup breadcrumbs

4 tbsp olive oil for frying (divided)

4 tbsp butter (divided)

4 cups mixed greens

1 cup herb vinaigrette

2 tbsp fresh parsley, chopped

#### **Balsamic Herb Vinaigrette Ingredients:**

1/2 cup Balsamic vinegar

2 tbsp honey

1 tsp Dijon mustard

1 tsp salt

Freshly ground pepper to taste

2 tsp fresh basil, finely chopped

2 tsp fresh parsley, finely chopped

2 tsp fresh oregano, chopped

1 cup olive oil

#### Preparation method:

Cut turkey breast into 3/4-inch pieces. Pound to 1/4-inch thick with a meat mallet.

On a large plate, mix flour, salt and pepper. On a second plate, beat eggs and water together. On a third plate, place breadcrumbs. Dredge dry, pounded turkey breast pieces into seasoned flour mix, then egg mixture, then breadcrumbs.

In a hot sauté pan, melt butter and oil. When sizzling, place turkey in pan and brown for about 2 minutes per side. Cook in batches. Do not crowd the pan. Transfer to a platter to keep warm. In a medium sized bowl, mix greens with 1/4 cup vinaigrette. Divide salad among 4 plates. Place a piece of fried turkey on top of greens. Garnish with fresh parsley and drizzle extra vinaigrette as desired.
